Success is the mildest adjective that can be applied to the won-derful two-day show staged by Chairman, Anne Mack and her tireless committees in presenting the Society's Second Annual Mushroom Exhibit. The many members who participated in this enterprise are too numerous to be individually commended here, but special credit must go to George Mack who loaned us his wife for the many weeks required to plan, organize and stage our show. We wish him speedy recovery from his diet of TV-dinners.

A few statistics: Attendance - 3760 paid admissions, adult and children; 1130 admitted on Science Center tickets and memberships; 290 Society members and families; for a total attendance of 5180. Species exhibited: 230 estimated by Connie Wood. New members - 66.

We owe special thanks to many persons who are not members of the Society for support and assistance: The overworked Science Center staff, particularly Jim Backstrom, who overcame their apprehensions about what we would do to their prized Eames Theatre and gave every cooperation; John Reddin of the Seattle Times and Jean Lunzer of the Seattle P-I for publicizing our show; the King County Park Department who generously permitted our removal of some king-sized cattails for decorations; Mr. Small, Enumclaw District Forest Ranger, who not only permitted but assisted in the gathering of trees and greenery; Ostrom Mushroom Company who provided the exhibit of growing Agaricus commercial species; and the various merchants who loaned mushroom products for display.

CLASSES PLANNED

After prolonged consideration of the type of instruction that will most benefit the largest number of our members, the Board has come to the decision that a Society-wide course in the generic concepts of the fleshy fungi, particularly the Agaricaceae (gilled Mushroom), would be most fruitful. The course would provide for each member a firm basis and a necessary step toward the identification of mushrooms. We therefor propose, commencing with the January meeting, to conduct four-session lecture series dealing with the botany of fungi, nomenclature and terminology, classification in terms of the Friesian genera, use of keys, and introduction to the bases of modern taxonomy. The courses are being planned by a committee consisting of George Rafanelli, George Tokuda, Anne Mack and Connie Wood under the guidance of Dr. Stuntz. . . course outline and other printed material will be distributed and will permit members to be able to skip a class without losing continuity. Slides and other visual aids will supplement and clarify the lecture material. The classes will occupy a portion of the meeting time not to exceed (we hope) one hour, thus leaving room for other interesting program material and necessary Society business. We hope that all members will avail themselves of this opportunity to become knowledgeable amateurs in mycology and be stimulated to pursue further study to advance their skills.

AMANITA PHALLOIDES First authenticated collection of Amanita Phalloides in the Puget Sound area is reported by Dr. Stuntz, found growing under birches in the yard of a Mercer Island resident. This is the deadly European species which, together with its closely associated species, A. verna and A. Virosa, accounts for over 90% of the fatalities due to mushroom poisoning. The collection has been turned over to the US Pharmacognosy Department for testing of toxic contents.
